**From the Intentional Interim Pastor

“What Do You Want?”

One of the best-known and most-beloved psalms is Psalm 23, the “Shepherd Psalm.” There we learn that the Lord is our Shepherd. And since He is our Shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our Shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our Shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we live as though this is not the case. We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our Shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord’s sheep.

When do we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd? When we put anything else before Him and His provision for us. When we think that going to work is more important than receiving His gifts in church on Sunday (*in violation of the First and Third Commandments*). When we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we don’t know what the future will bring (*even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters*).

We live as though we are not the Lord’s sheep when we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will help themselves. We act this way because our minds are set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We act this way because we have stopped hearing the call of our Shepherd, which comes through His Word.

Through the Word of God, the Shepherd calls us to Himself. Through the Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through the Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead us to our true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here’s the Good News: the Lord is your Shepherd, even and especially for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the Shepherd who lays down His life for His sheep. The Lord is your Shepherd. Let us live as His sheep.

Did you know? 82% of people who do not attend church say that they would be somewhat likely or very likely to attend a service or other church events if they were personally invited.

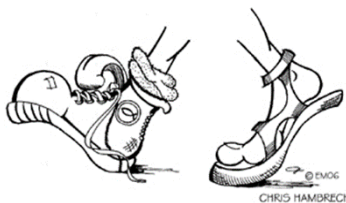

News Items

- **Lutheran Church Missouri Synod 2023–2026 National Offering** - The LCMS reaches out to individuals from non-English speaking cultures every day. So we can share the life-giving Gospel message across cultural and language lines, the 2023-2026 National Offering will make possible the translation of carefully selected Lutheran outreach resources into languages other than English. The National Offering coincides with the 2023 Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod on July 29-Aug. 3 in Milwaukee. Connected to the theme of the convention, this triennium's National Offering — "We Preach Christ Crucified for All People" — will focus on translating introductory Christian resources into as many as five major languages. Congregations, schools, and other groups will be able to utilize these evangelism, educational, and catechetical resources to help non-English speakers clearly hear and read the Good News. A gracious friend of the Synod has offered to match National Offering gifts dollar-for-dollar up to \$50,000, or until the opening worship service of the 2023 Convention. ESLC will place special emphasis on and encourage our members to give in support of the LCMS National Offering. In order to take advantage of the matching gift we will combine all contributions received on or before July 9th and send our contribution soon after.

- 3) **From our website, select the VANCO electronic giving option. Then select the National Offering option to designate your contributions.**

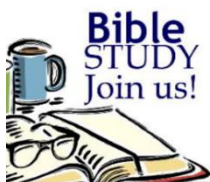
We will continue to accept contributions after the July 9th date. These will be forwarded at the end of each month.

Note from our Treasurer!

Members of ESLC,

Just wanted to give a quick update on the status of our finances.

At this time, we are in a very stable and strong status, with 2023 contributions outpacing those of last year. At our last voters'/congregational meeting a few issues were brought to the attention of all present. At this time the second parking lot repair and replacement of the fascia board has been placed in limbo as we work on a few of the other issues. We filed an insurance claim on the damage caused by the woodpeckers, unfortunately that claim was denied. So, the council will discuss and formulate a plan to move forward with the necessary repairs. We did have some water damage from the last rainstorm, but we were able to take care of that in-house. However, some work needs to be done to keep this from recurring. The electrical issue to the garage has been diagnosed and we hope that the necessary repairs can be kept to a minimum.



The month of May is our most challenging since we receive bills on property insurance, workman's comp, fire suppression and alarm system test, and backflow tests on our building and sprinkler systems. We have placed funds in escrow to cover these if no surprises show up. Unfortunately, one has hit us again. If you recall last year, we received an unexpected increase in our property insurance requiring us to make some substantial adjustments to lower our annual premium back to \$9,400. A few weeks ago, we received our 2023-2024 bill totaling \$11,014. We were also informed to expect similar increases next year, so the council will need to begin a plan to address this and future increases.

Again, for now our escrow and balance in the General Fund has allowed us to pay all these bills in full and will need to amend our escrow projections for the future.

We give thanks that we had the funds needed to stay current with all our bills and payroll. We all know that historically we have become challenged in the summer months and I will try to keep you all informed on our financial status if it is foreseen.

Keep the financial status of our congregation in your thoughts and prayers.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC — JUNE 1-30

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) officially began work in the Dominican Republic in 2004. Over the years, a group home was established to care for orphaned children with disabilities; congregations and mission plants were started; and a deaconess-training program was launched. The LCMS seminary in Santiago, Dominican Republic, trains students from around the Latin America region.

Remember God's work in the Dominican Republic as you pray:

- 1.** *for the seminary students who will enter the seminary this fall, that they would be able to acquire their student visas and other documentation needed to study in the Dominican Republic.*
- 2.** *for seminary students and their families, that they would have a smooth transition to life in a new place away from family and friends. Praise God for these dedicated students who are willing to leave home to obtain a solid theological education.*
- 3.** *that God would grant the seminary students determination and endurance, so that they might be diligent in their studies*

and make the most of their education.

- 4.** *for the women studying to be deaconesses, that the theological coursework and intensive practical experience would form them into capable and effective deaconesses.*
- 5.** *that God would grant strength to our deaconesses as they support the work of pastors by caring for the poor, the marginalized and the sick.*
- 6.** *with thanksgiving for all the faithful and generous people who have prayed or given of their time or treasures to make the seminary and mercy center a reality.*

7. *for the seminary professors, that they would be well-prepared to impart wisdom and knowledge to their students.*

8. *that the Spanish-language theological library at the seminary would be well used and a blessing to the students and faculty.*

9. *for the families of the professors, that they would adapt easily and find joy in a new country and culture.*

10. *for Lutheran congregations in Latin America, that they would be prepared to care for and support their pastors physically, mentally and spiritually.*

11. *for seminary students who are serving vicarages, that they would learn much from their experience and be better prepared for their future ministry.*

12. *for all the missionaries and leaders of the Dominican church, that they would discern God's*

will so that they can build a firm foundation for the church for generations to come.

13. *that God would raise up individuals and congregations to support our LCMS missionaries in the Dominican Republic.*

14. *that God would supply faithful and capable men and women to serve as missionaries, both in Latin America and around the world.*

15. *with thanksgiving for faithful men and women who have given up the comforts of home and family to faithfully serve on the mission field.*

16. *that many in the Dominican Republic would hear God's Word and believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Pray that they would attend worship each Sunday to receive the Word and Sacraments.*

17. *that God would grant health and safety to all missionaries and their families.*

18. *that the Dominican Christians would continue to study God's Word and be strengthened to live faithfully and serve their neighbors in love.*

19. *with thanksgiving for the willingness of the Dominican people to hear and learn God's Word. By God's grace, the LCMS has established congregations and mission stations around the country.*

20. *that God would raise up many Lutheran school teachers and school administrators — especially from among the Dominican congregations — to meet the needs of the large number of eager students.*

21. *that the families of our Lutheran school children would also hear God's Word and be brought to faith.*

22. *with thanksgiving for the large and ever-growing number of students seeking education in our Lutheran schools in the Dominican Republic.*

23. *that the Lutheran mission churches in the Dominican*

Republic would continue to grow and mature through regular worship and Bible study.

24. *with thanksgiving for the many faithful Christians who regularly worship in our mission congregations.*

25. *with thanksgiving for Hogares Lutheranos El Buen Pastor (Good Shepherd Lutheran Home), which provides a safe and nurturing facility for young people with developmental disabilities.*

26. *that God would grant patience and endurance for the faithful workers who care for the group home's residents. Praise God that He has used these wonderful young people to teach the Dominican Lutheran church about His love and mercy.*

27. *with thanksgiving that the residents of Hogares Lutheranos El Buen Pastor have become active members of the local Lutheran church, where they are eager to hear God's Word and to serve in any way possible.*

28. *with thanksgiving for the willingness of faithful and gentle caregivers who serve the residents of Good Shepherd Lutheran Home.*



29. *for all the mission work throughout the Caribbean and Latin America.*

30. *with thanksgiving that we are one in Christ with our brothers and sisters in Christ in Latin America.*
