A Better Way

The most common question about stewardship is not whether a Christian should give to their church. Of course, Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the question asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Christians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?" Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians should tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income — terms similar to a tithe(2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7). But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry. It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So,

we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike — promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disappoint.

AWAITING THE DAY OF VICTORY

If you've ever lived on a farm or visited one at the right time, you probably have seen one of the most amusing things that can happen there. In the winter, the young cattle are put in barns to protect them from the bitter cold outside. They stay there until spring comes when they are let loose into the pasture. The moment the doors and gates are opened, those young calves take off for the wide-open spaces like a bunch of clowns. They kick their heels high in the air and dance in circles. They act as if they were the happiest creatures God ever made. In our passage for today, Malachi compares the joy of those who believe in Christ as their personal Savior from sin, death and hell to the joy of those released calves. Even while living here on earth, we have already experienced that joy. It's the deep happiness that comes from knowing that our souls are secure for eternity—safe in the hands of Jesus our Lord.

But that joy has only just begun. Everything is not perfect yet. Being a believer and follower of Jesus is not all sunshine and roses. We find that we are continually plagued by enemies—there is that unbelieving person who regularly pokes fun at our faithfulness to the Lord. There is the old evil Foe himself, Satan, who is always trying to tempt us to sin, and succeeding far too often. And there is one final enemy—death. These enemies are terrifying—and powerful. Who are we to cope with them? But God promises us in this passage that these enemies shall one day be totally put down. They will be as powerless on the great day of the Lord as the dirt we walk on. The Lord has already won the victory. It began with the birth of the Christ Child and His work on the cross and concluded when Jesus rose from the dead-on Easter morning. He gave us visible proof that He had the power to conquer all our enemies—even death. We have a share in that victory through faith in Christ

as our Savior. For us it's only a matter of time until we sit at the victory table with our Lord in heaven. When judgment day comes, we will experience firsthand what it means to have absolutely perfect happiness and joy forevermore.

Here's something to think about as we move forward. Martin Luther once said, "If someone would knock on my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would say, 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he has moved out and Jesus has moved in.' " Martin Luther lived for Jesus just as we should do too. In Galatians 2:20 the apostle Paul wrote that he, too, lived for Jesus. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God." Who or what do you live for? If we live for ourselves and the things of the world, we will focus our attention and energy on amassing more and more things. It is easy for money and possessions to become overly important because our society tells us that more is better and that happiness and success can only be achieved by having the newest and best things. To find happiness and success, we work long and hard. King Solomon, who was wealthy and wise, tried almost everything and found no satisfaction with things of the world. In Ecclesiastes, he tells us that he tried wine and women; he built houses, gardens, and parks; he bought slaves, herds and flocks, and amassed silver and gold. "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure . . . Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun." (Ecc. 2:10-11). Regarding money, Solomon wrote, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless" (vs. 5:10).

In closing the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man. For God will bring every deed into judgment..." (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). The only thing that finally gave Solomon's life purpose was living for God. Likewise, we as Christians understand that Jesus is the only person who can give us lasting peace, comfort, and security. He alone meets our needs. Jesus' tremendous sacrifice showed us His love for us and His love compels us to love Him and live for Him. Filled with Jesus' presence in our lives, we are empowered to overcome the pull of the world. So lets continue moving forward, seeing what we can be, and let us live for Jesus! Using wisely our time, talents, and treasures in service to the Lord.

District President's Visit Assures the Light of Christ Will Guide

March 19 was a special day at Eternal Savior. Rocky Mountain District President James Maxwell joined us to preach and meet with us to share the foundations and expectations for our upcoming Call process, whereby the Holy Spirit will guide us in selecting Eternal Savior's next pastor.



The Gospel text from John 9 (Jesus gives the blind man sight on the Sabbath) served as a very fitting basis for President Maxwell's sermon. Just as the Pharisees did, how often we question Jesus' love and power in our lives. Yet in His great love, Jesus guides, protects and gives us light to see even in times of uncertainty. His light will guide our seeing clearly in our Call process, and give us vision and direction to know the right man to serve as our shepherd at Eternal Savior. Praise God! In addition to President Maxwell's sermon, several other elements of the service highlighted the Light of Christ in our lives. Pastor Schultz, in his children's message, shared the importance of light in taking away the darkness, and removing fear, and especially highlighted that Jesus is the light of the world that guides us every day, through all things.



A special musical duet by Mark Bunge and Jan Ertle reinforced Psalm 119:105, telling us that there is never need to worry or fear; that Christ is always beside us. His Word is a lamp unto our feet, and a light unto our path.

During distribution of the Lord's Supper, Katie Reuer's piano offering of "Come Thou, Almighty King" prayed that God would always come to us and be near us

through the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Praise God for all He does in giving us light and strength in our lives!

Following worship, we gathered in the Fellowship Hall over coffee and delicious fruit breads as President Maxwell took us through a short Bible study.

We considered "why" we need a pastor, the mission of the church, and the ministry of the Word. Several Bible passages reinforced answers to these topics, including Matthew 28:18-20, Ephesians 4:11-12, and Matthew



16:19. Regarding the Call process, President Maxwell noted that our Call Committee must be formed in accordance with the version of our Constitution on file at the RMD office. We've completed this step with our Call Committee already in place. Next, the Self Study is important. This document gives our District President a profile of our congregation, and an aggregate view from our members of the priorities for Eternal Savior, and the most important qualities/strengths we desire of our next pastor. A congregational

survey is now available for every member to fill out, to assure all voices are heard. Our District President will use this input to create a list of candidates that best match our stated needs. Additionally, members of the congregation are encouraged to submit candidates for our next pastor as well.



Our meeting with President Maxwell was very helpful in connecting all of us with the Biblical underpinnings of pastoral ministry, and with the specifics of the process. We closed with prayer before enjoying a beautiful and delicious charcuterie table. A hearty thank you goes to Cindy Stahly and many ladies in the congregation for preparing and serving these special refreshments!



Much lies ahead. Some uncertainty? For sure! Will God, the Holy Spirit guide us? Unquestionably, yes! Do we each have work to do? Absolutely! Here is a homework list for each of us, to assure the best possible outcome for our Call process:

1. Complete the Congregational Survey by April 2, 2023. It's available in paper form and as an online survey. Copies are available on the coffee bar in the Narthex.

- 2. Prayerfully consider if you want to nominate a pastoral candidate for consideration. What qualities would make him a good fit at Eternal Savior?
- 3. Attend our next Congregational meeting at 10:30AM on April 30. We will review the results of the Self Study and Survey, prior to submitting to President Maxwell.
- 4. Pray! For the Call Process, for the Call Committee, for our congregation!
