A Truly Happy New Year

Rejoice Always. 1 Thessalonians 5:16

Happy New Year! Happiness seems to be a fleeting concept these days, doesn't it? With all of the serious problems facing us, our society (economic problems, rising unemployment, political leaders involved in criminal activity, sicknesses etc., etc., etc.) who can be happy in times like these? Well, Saint Paul says we can! As Christians we have every reason in the world (and beyond, for that matter) to be the happiest people on earth. And that is what the Apostle Paul is getting at in this passage quoted above. Paul was writing to a world very similar to the one we live in today; where Christians were under political, physical and spiritual persecution for their beliefs and lived in very uncertain times. It would seem to anyone looking in that this ragtag group of people calling themselves followers of Christ should be the most miserable people around. Not so! Paul calls them to rejoice. And Rejoice Always! Why? Because the faith they had in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior is the same faith which gave them a complete and total victory over the world that was persecuting them! I love the way Paul speaks to them in this letter because it is one of such encouragement for people living in uncertain times. Just like us. And I know I sound like a broken record (or should I say, given the time we live in, skipped a cd?) when I say that the Word of God isn't just some crusty old Jewish fable that has no bearing on our lives today, but that statement can't be said enough. God's promises are applicable to our lives no matter where and when we live. And so that is my prayer for us this year. That we would take hold of the salvation we have in Jesus Christ as if our lives depend on it (because they do) and live in a way that reflects the reality of eternal life that we have in Jesus Christ. Through faith and the eternal life that we possess right now, we can live a



life of joyfully knowing that what God has promised us is far greater than any difficulty we might be facing here on earth! We might experience financial poverty here on earth but in Christ, we have riches beyond belief. Even though we live in an uncertain present, through faith our eternal future is absolutely guaranteed! If our salvation isn't reason enough to have a Happy New Year, I don't know what is! May God bless and keep us all in a joyful frame of mind in 2023 and far beyond!

The Season of Epiphany

The Christian Church has observed the season of Epiphany since the third century, A.D. The day of Epiphany always falls on January 6th, but it is generally celebrated on the first Sunday of the New Year. As Christmas marks the appearance of God to the human family in the person of Jesus Christ, the presence of the foreign Magi is symbolic that the one whom they sought as "King of the Jews" was "King of the Gentiles" as well. The visit of the wise men clearly indicates that it was the Gentiles who were ultimately to receive the Gospel.

Little is written in Scripture about the Magi. The only account of their visit can be found in the second chapter of Matthew's Gospel. However, much tradition has surrounded them. Matthew does not give us their names and does not even specify how many there were. The number three has evolved because they bore three gifts.

It took some time for the early church to accept the fact that Jesus was not sent to the Jews exclusively—But once the church, at Paul's urging, understood the universal intention of God, it set into motion a mighty missionary effort which reached throughout the Roman Empire.

The Good News which was shared with the Magi also extends to people of all nations, languages and colors. In the midst of yet another Epiphany season, we are made starkly aware that the missionary task of the church remains unfinished. Despite centuries of history, there are people near and far who still await the bright light of Jesus Christ to break the darkness of their lives.

Break a Resolution by Creating a Habit



The year 2023 is here! The start of a New Year is a time to take stock of our lives and how to make them better. Ah yes! the infamous New Year's Resolutions. Our new year's resolutions often revolve around health and our physical bodies, but they can also involve relationships, work, home, children or a whole host of other areas. Here's a New Year's resolution for all of us. Try changing your thinking from "resolution" to "habit." Often when we talk about habits, we think of negatives. Most of us have bad habits we've tried to break at one time

or another. But the very nature of a habit is why I think this might be a better way

to think of change.

A resolution, as we often joke about, seems to be easily broken. Why? A resolution is only words. To make change we need action. This is where habit comes in. If we want to make lasting change, it needs to become part of our lives, and it needs to become a habit. Research shows us it takes 30-60 days of repeated action for something to become a habit. It takes a conscious effort for a period of time before the change takes root.




Most resolutions fail 30-60 days after they have been made. The reason for this failure is because a conscious effort has not been made to make something a good habit.

There is an area of our lives in which I would like all of us to create new habits – getting into God's Word. Each Sunday, in the bulletin, are Scripture readings for each day of the week. This will help us to get into God's Word and become familiar with all the promises that God has for us. These readings will help us get through the Bible in a year. We also offer Bible class / instruct every Sunday Morning. Please come and join us. Make it a habit. The Bible is the very source of life for us and it is an important book for us to "read, mark, learn and inwardly digest" (Martin Luther). But the Bible can be overwhelming. Sixty-six different books, strange stories from foreign cultures, sections that just seem so hard to read through (not like a popular novel or magazine). How can we ever make studying God's Word a habit? The answer is little by little.

Make Bible study a habit —do it consistently and often enough that it will become more natural in your daily life. At Eternal Savior Lutheran Church we have many opportunities. So no excuses! Ichthys: The Creed in Brief



The fish, *ichthys* in Greek, is the symbol for the Savior Jesus Christ. It is so used already in the first century, not primarily because fish played a part in Jesus' life or because He appointed His apostles to be spiritual fishermen using the net of the Gospel, but because *ichthys* could be used as a rebus from which one could derive a statement of faith. The word consists of these five letters of the Greek alphabet: i-ch-th-y-s. When these five letters are regarded as initials for five words, we obtain this Christian declaration: *Iesous Christos Theou Yios Soter*. These words say:

Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior. Very likely the ichthys symbol was used as a sign by which early Christians

found and identified one another, especially in times of persecution. When scrawled on a wall or on the ground in the marketplace or near a fountain where people congregated, it let wandering Christians know that others of their faith had come to this community. A scene in a religious movie shows a man introducing himself to another by scratching the fish symbol into the sand before him. The *ichthys* concept as explained is the Christian creed in brief: Jesus Christ is the Son of God and Savior of the world. St. John writes in his First Epistle: "We have seen and testify that the Father has sent His Son as the Savior of the world." We can testify to our Christian faith today through the symbol of the *ichthys*, perhaps wearing it as a piece of jewelry or posting it as a door plate. When people ask what the picture of the fish means, we have a golden opportunity to explain who Jesus Christ is and what He means to us and what he has done for us.
