A Fruitful Church

"All over the world this gospel is bearing fruit and growing, just as it has been doing among you since the day you heard it and understood God's grace in all its truth." Colossians 1:6

We say: "All God expects of us is faithfulness!" Wrong! He expects faithfulness and fruitfulness! Fruitfulness is a major theme of the New Testament: Scripture says, "...I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit - fruit that will last..." (John 15:16). God wants to see lasting results from our ministry "This is to My Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be My disciples" (John 15:8). A successful ministry is proof that we are following in Christ's footsteps: "We pray... that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please Him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work..." (Colossians 1:10). Our ultimate goal should be to please the Lord in all that we do.

You see, the nation of Israel lost its privileges because of unfruitfulness. Listen once again to the Word of God: "...the Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit" (Matthew 21:43). The same principle applies to churches. We've all seen God remove His hand of blessing from churches - churches that have been greatly blessed in the past - because they became self-satisfied, self-absorbed and stopped bearing fruit.

The word fruit is used about 55 times in the New Testament and refers to repentance (Matthew 3:8); practicing the truth (Matthew 7:16-21); answered prayer (John 15:7-8); giving to God (Romans 15:26-28); winning the lost (Romans 1:13). The truth is, God wants us to be faithful- and fruitful! As long as there is still one unreached soul, and we have a community full of them for whom Christ died, our work has not been completed. There's much to be done!

Many churches justify their lack of growth by saying, "God hasn't called us to be fruitful, just faithful." Actually, God expects both! Being "fruitful" involves fulfilling the great commission to win the world. Being "faithful" means accomplishing as much as possible with the resources and talents He's given you. That's why comparing churches is a mistake. Success isn't being larger than some other church; it's bearing as much fruit as possible, given your gifts, opportunities and potential. Christ doesn't expect you to produce more fruit than you can, but He does expect you to produce all that you can by His power. And that's a lot more than most of us think is possible! If we're not breaking new ground in our ministry then it's not requiring that we use our faith, and if our ministry doesn't require any faith then we're not being faithful.

Are we being faithful to God's Word if we keep communicating it in an outdated style that fails to reach people or insist on doing ministry in a way that's comfortable for us, even though it doesn't produce any results? Too many of us are orthodox in our beliefs, but unfaithful to Christ because we refuse to change programs, methods, styles of worship, or even locations in order to reach a lost world for Him. Vance Havner (a pastor and missionary) used to say: "A church can be straight as a gun barrel doctrinally, and just as empty spiritually." We must be willing to say with unreserved commitment, We'll do whatever it takes to reach people for Christ. That is what we are to do! And that is the mission that we've been called to do.

"Keep Your Eye on the Ball"

Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:2)

Growing up in a small town in east central Minnesota, I heard, many times, my uncle say "Keep your eye on the ball." It didn't matter if we were playing baseball, basketball, football, darts, golf, ping-pong, archery, or target practice; this was my uncle's universal "sporting" advice, "Keep your eye on the ball." This was his way of saying "keep on track", (watch what you're doing.) This was his way of saying; you can have a great game if you keep your eyes and your focus on the one thing that matters: the ball (the target). Taking your eyes off of the ball means a dropped ball, a missed pass or some other "error" that can cause you to lose your focus.

And so, it is in the Lord's church. There is one thing that matters: Jesus Christ and Him crucified. We are given a gift by the Holy Spirit, a faith that keeps our eyes (and our minds) on Jesus. When our eyes are kept on Jesus we are rejoicing in God's gifts, all the gifts that Jesus gives: the forgiveness of our sins, eternal life, salvation, heaven, His kingdom, His church and so much more. The devil wants nothing more than to divert our eyes from Jesus, to steal our joy. He tries to take our joy in Christ away. Taking our eyes off of Jesus and blaming others for things that have happen in the past can only lead to hopelessness and despair. So let us not blame one another for things that have happen in the past.

Remember the story of Peter walking on the water? When the disciples saw Jesus walking on the water they were afraid, thinking they saw a ghost. Jesus comforts them saying, "Be of good cheer! It is I; do not be afraid" (*Mt 14:27*). Peter answers, "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water." Jesus says, "Come," and Peter does, walking on the water with Jesus. But then as it were Peter 'takes his eye off the ball.' The text says that "when he saw that the wind was boisterous, he was afraid; and beginning to sink, he cried out" (*Mt 14:30*). Peter was distracted with the wind and the waves, and taking his eyes off of Jesus, he began to sink. But Peter's cry was a cry for help, "Lord, save me!" And Jesus answered his prayer, "immediately" stretching out his hand and catching him. The same Lord Jesus is faithful to answer our prayers. As our focus is distracted and our eyes drawn away for the gifts of God in Christ Jesus, we, too, cry out, "Lord, help us!" And Jesus is quick to save, to draw our eyes back to Him and the gifts He desires to give us.

So I appeal to you...to strive together with me...so that by God's Will, we may have joy and be refreshed" (*Ro 15:29-32*). Let each one of us, by the grace of God, ask the Lord for help. Lord help us to "keep our eye on the ball, which is you and let not us look for faults of one another or for things that have happened of the past."

My dear friends, let us give praise, honor and glory to Christ in all that we do. And by His grace, join me in doing just that. May we fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith.

Lenten Discipline: Denying the Self

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts — the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God which pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh, but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

Fasting is a good example of this outward training. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. But you have learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above to discipline the desires of your body. Another example is almsgiving. An increase in giving to the church and its mission during Lent is also a form of outward training. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are

training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is — it leads you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs. (1 Tim. 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.

March 2023 marks the tenth month of Interim Ministry at Eternal Savior and our fifteenth month of vacancy. Our congregation is well-organized and moving with God's guidance toward calling our next Pastor.

The IITT (Intentional Interim Taskforce Team), along with Elders and Church Council, met with our District President, Rev. James Maxwell, on January 31. We shared an overview of the congregation, our mission, and our journey with interim ministry thus far. We also discussed our next steps and plans toward calling a pastor. President Maxwell remarked that our congregation is very well-organized and has taken a thorough approach toward interim ministry. On **March 19, we will welcome President Maxwell to Eternal Savior** once again. This time, he will preach as part of our Sunday morning worship that day. Following worship, we will hold a **congregational meeting** where President Maxwell will speak to the entire congregation to educate us and answer our questions about the Call process. Please mark your calendars and prioritize attendance on March 19th.

Our congregation will also complete a Self-Study. This document is the vehicle by which our congregation officially shares with the District President our ministry priorities, and important qualities of our next pastor. We have received a copy of the Self Study template, and the IITT, Elders and Officers have been actively working to organize how we will complete the study. There are three sections: congregational statistics, ministry priorities, and qualities of our next pastor. **Every member of our congregation will have the opportunity to complete a survey** regarding ministry priorities and pastoral qualities. Following President Maxwell's visit on March 19th, we will open the survey for all members to complete. The survey will be available in two formats: in paper form to return to the church office, and as an online survey. There will even be a children's version of the survey! All surveys will be completed anonymously. The results will be aggregated, and

emerging themes will be shared with the congregation. We plan to hold another congregational meeting to do this, prior to submitting to our District President in April. He will use this information to search for and create lists of candidates that we will consider for a Call.

Additionally, the Voters of Eternal Savior have officially **ratified the Call Committee for calling our next pastor**. Our constitution requires five voting members to form this committee. We were blessed with seven capable leaders to fill out the committee:

The Reredos Project Completed!













This project was a long-term project with first initial email exchanges beginning in February of 2020. Then COVID hit in March and the committee held many meetings via zoom.

Committee members were Mary Bunge, Keith Cowley, Jan Ertle, Stacy Jundt, Lindalee Koehler, Tom and Cindy Stahly, Linda Thompson, and Robin Warnken. Marge Paugh and Pastor Rhode were also part of the committee. Pastor Schulz joined the committee upon his arrival to ESLC.



Hours were spent having fruitful conversations discussing designs for the wall and material choices considering load bearing for the floor. The decision was made to have a mountain scene borrowing from the beautiful environment God has created for us in Colorado.

The committee worked with the Liturgical Art Center at Seward Concordia for about a year to focus details on the shape and color of the mountains. The sunrise/sunset color was added to fill in the large amount of white space above the mountains and helped to complete the scene. This design was approved by the congregation in November and the committee noted

comments of members and brought those concerns to the artist, Gigi Douglas. Ms. Douglas helped us dial in the exact colors to use and tweaked the shape of the mountain peaks.

The mural was painted by Ms. Douglas during the week of February 5th. Great consideration was taken to keep the cross as the focus of the wall by using muted, soft colors that complement the decor of the sanctuary. The overall concept of the wall is to represent the Trinity. The mural painting of the mountains with the sunrise/sunset represent God the Father's majestic creation. The cross represents Jesus, the Son and our Savior who died on the cross for our sins. Plans are for a stained-glass dove in the round window above to represent the Holy Spirit. The Trinity would then be completed.

The committee updated the candles with pillar candles on floating shelves that match the rest of the wood on the chancel. A special "Thank You" to Tom Stahly for sharing his wood working skills by making the shelves. The hymn boards and banners were removed from the Reredos so there would be no distractions. We will be keeping the banners in banner stands and moving them around the sanctuary until we decide on a good location. Let us know if you have ideas. Thank you to the congregation for supporting us during this project. It is a big change and hope that it enhances your worship. A special "Thank You" to all the members that helped to move furniture pieces off the chancel, clean, put down plastic and then put everything back together.
