

They are the most iconic slogans of all time. Nothing can or will ever compare to them. They have dominated billboards, television, and radio throughout the country for years. These very slogans, without a doubt, have inspired and empowered many generations over the years, encouraging the young to go ahead and take the leap forward, to become a part of something greater, something prodigious. If you're not sure what I am talking about yet, then let me fill you in. As you may have guessed, I happen to be talking about the famous slogans of the military. One of these greatest slogans ever comes from the Marine Corps, "Looking for a Few Good Men." Later, this slogan added an additional catchphrase to it, "The Few, the Proud. The Marines." The Air Force tried to duplicate the success of the Marines, their slogan is "Aim High". And later, additions were added to that slogan too: "Aim High, Fly High and Fight".

The Navy wouldn't be left out. So, they coined their own catchphrase too, "Forged By the Sea", which encompasses that one is never alone you are always surrounded by water. And of course, it was a hit, an instant smash as it were. Numerous young people took the challenge and joined the Navy.

Over the years, the Army slogans were creative too. If you recall, in World War I, a poster was created of a man with a white beard, known as Uncle Sam, pointing his index finger at you saying, "I Want You for the U.S. Army" During the 1950's and 60's the slogan was changed to "Choice, Not Change". And during the 70's, the campaign was "Today's Army Wants You." From 1980 to 2001, the best Army slogan was "Be All That You Can Be." From 2001 to 2006, the slogan was "Army of One" promoting teamwork and the power of many together as one. And from 2006 until 2018, the army would try to top them all. Their new simple catchphrase was "Be Strong", "Be Army Strong."

Even the Coast Guard wanted to share in the excitement. Their slogan is simple and yet so effective, "Semper Paratus" which means "Born Ready", implying that they are standing eagerly ready to face any and all dangers. These slogans reflect the unique character of the branches of the military, and they all underscore the high caliber of those who join and serve. But, what about the Christian? What about the Church Militant? Are there any catchphrases for us? Are there any slogans in the Bible for us to follow? Truth be told there are many in the Bible. A few important ones come to mind: "Be My Witnesses" (*Acts 1:8*), or "Feed My Sheep" (*John 21:17*), or "Set Your Mind ..." (*Colossians 3:2*), or "Set You Free" (*John 8:32*), or "Hear my Voice" (*Psalm 5:3*), or "Be a

Man" (1 Kings 2:2), or "Put your house in order" (Isaiah 38:1), or "Fight the Good Fight" (1 Timothy 6:12). There is simply no denying the power that lies behind such slogans or catchphrases.

The whole point of slogans is to encourage and to get people excited about what's happening around them, calling attention to something of greatness. The problem is we don't have a catchphrase or slogan for Eternal Savior Lutheran Church, yet. Truth be told, I am at a loss on how to get people excited and involved in church. The point is, we have a lot to be thankful for. God is good. There are a lot of great things happening here at Eternal Savior Lutheran Church. I am honored to be the pastor here, even if it's only for a short term. It's exciting! But how do we get people involved? How do we get congregants excited about the future? How do we get people to volunteer and be a part of something greater? How do we get the people of Eternal Savior to realize that they can be so much more than what they are? This is the dilemma that we face in the church post COVID. Jesus Himself said, *"The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few" (Matthew 9:37).*

So, here is our new transitory slogan for the upcoming New Year: "Let's Just Do It" or "Let's Get to Work", or "Let's Be All That We Can Be!" or "Living Life to the Glory of God!" As we continue to embark on a new journey, known as Intentional Interim Ministry, we need volunteer support. We need you! It is essential for a successful and growing future. So here is my personal plea, "Please, please consider volunteering your time, talent and treasures. Do it for the good of the church and to the glory of God.

2022 Convention Results

There were 167 attendees in Albuquerque. Our district's "what's your 80?" was 80 convention voters. Bylaws were approved and a mission goal of \$123,000 (which includes mission grants, scholarships, and mites to national). Monies were collected for mites (\$2782.64 offering + \$157 moving for mites), the Lighthouse Mission (\$1470.50), and Tender Loving Care Community (\$1367.57), as of 6/5/22.

Quilting

We hope you have enjoyed the quilts made for Orphan Grain Train(OGT) displayed in the Narthex. OGT has a 4-star rating by Charity Navigator.com.

As of July 2021, our total of donated quilts was 1,356. Earlier this year we contributed 10 boxes holding 18 full and 10 baby quilts for a total of 1, 435 quilts for OGT. Last week, OGT picked up 18 boxes containing 37 baby quilts and 32 full quilts for a grand total for our group of <u>1,505</u> quilts. Praise the Lord for all our faithful workers.

When OGT representatives picked up our quilts they said that OGT had sent 6 cargo plane loads of clothes, food, quilts, and medical supplies to Poland to be distributed to Ukraine.

Don't let the word "quilting" scare anyone. If you look at the OGT quilts you will see no "quilting", just knots tied in the middle and corners of the squares! We start by putting squares together in some form of pattern (designing). They are sewn together by volunteers and then returned to



us. Back at church we put together a backing fabric batting and a top of squares (layering). The edges of the quilt are then



sewn together and returned to us. Lastly, we tie the quilt together to hold the layers firmly in place.

We can use help at any stage. Please help us by sewing fabric squares into

quilt tops. Packages of squares including directions, are located in the box by the LWML display in the Narthex. Our continued thanks goes to the Deacons Fund for paying for our batting. The Lord continues to provide fabric for us with donations from some of our

members.

Reredos Committee - Here are the most recent renderings from the Liturgical Art Center at Concordia University in Seward, NE. We requested that they add the burnt orange on the upper edges of the Reredos and then slowly transition to a creamy white behind the cross. This color transition with white behind the cross draws your eye to the cross as the focal point of the sanctuary. An option to consider is moving the banners to the walls behind the choir pews and behind the bell choir tables. This helps to eliminate any distraction from the cross. We also added possible features to our round window. The descending dove represents the Holy Spirit. The cross represents the Son, and the creation of beautiful mountains and sunsets represents the Father. As Lutherans, it is most certainly true that some have seen the round window as the perfect place to display Luther's seal. Another change is the removal of the candelabras and using 3" pillar candles on floating wooden shelves that will match wood on altar. The committee will meet again to discuss these most recent changes and we hope to bring final plans with details and pricing to the November Voters meeting for a vote.
